# HALTWHISTLE'S HISTORY & HERITAGE

Discovered in 1836, the Thorngrifton Hoard is a collection of ancient Roman coins found by workers quarrying stone. The hoard, which includes gold and copper coins, highlights the area's historical significance during the Roman era. The empty arm-purse that contained the coins can be viewed at the museum at Chesters Fort

## **Haltwhistle Viaduct**

The Haltwhistle Viaduct is a notable architectural feature south of the railway station. It was an essential part of the Alston Line, connecting Haltwhistle to Alston in Cumbria. The viaduct is a reminder of the town's important role in regional transportation history

## **Bellister Castle and Featherstone Castle**

These nearby historic properties, including Bellister Castle and Featherstone Castle, are notable landmarks. They are Grade II listed buildings that add to the region's rich tapestry of medieval and post-medieval architecture



# Transportation

## Railway

The town is served by Haltwhistle railway station on the Newcastle and Carlisle Railway, also known as the Tyne Valley Line. The line was opened in 1838 and links the city of Newcastle upon Tyne in Tyne and Wear with Carlisle in Cumbria. The line follows the course of the River Tyne through Northumberland.

Passenger services on the Tyne Valley Railway are operated by Northern and ScotRail. The line is also heavily used for freight. The railway station is on the south side of the town, close by the River South Tyne.

Until 1976, the railway station was also the junction of the branch line to Alston, in Cumbria, which was 13 miles (21 km) in length. Part of the southern section of the Haltwhistle to Alston line has been reopened as a 2 ft (610 mm) narrow gauge railway, known as the South Tynedale Railway, between Alston and Slaggyford. The trust that owns and operates the railway intends to reopen the entire branch line from Alston to Haltwhistle

## Road

The A69 trunk road, which links Carlisle and Newcastle upon Tyne, formerly passed south of the town centre and through its western outskirts, until a full bypass was opened in 1997.

## Bus Services

The town is also served by local bus services, providing connections to nearby villages, towns, and attractions. These bus routes offer convenient transportation options for residents who may not have access to a car or for visitors looking to explore the surrounding areas without driving.

## Walking and Cycling

Haltwhistle's compact size and scenic surroundings make it ideal for walking and cycling. # Regeneration

Residents of Haltwhistle, Bellingham, and Prudhoe, along with Alnwick, Bedlington, Newbiggin, and Rothbury, are encouraged to provide input on multi-million pound investment plans as part of the Borderlands Growth Deal. Each town could receive up to £3 million through a 'Place Plan' over the next decade, with an additional £50 million allocated for the initiative's 'Place Programmed'. Online consultations will gather feedback on town strengths, areas for improvement, and ideas for investment. The approach to investment will be tailored to each town's needs, considering the impact of Covid-19 and focusing on recovery, resilience, and growth. The aim is to involve communities in decision-making, with a focus on revitalizing local economies, town centers, and key sites. Coun. Wojciech Ploszaj highlights the importance of community involvement in shaping the future of their towns, emphasizing potential uses of funding for regeneration, arts, culture, tourism, and community facilities.
